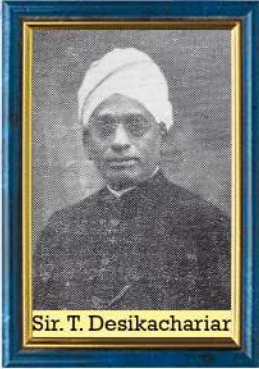

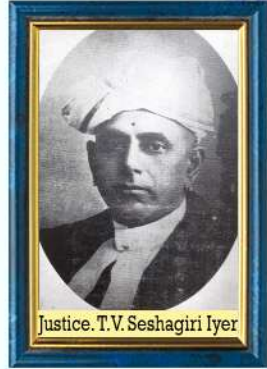

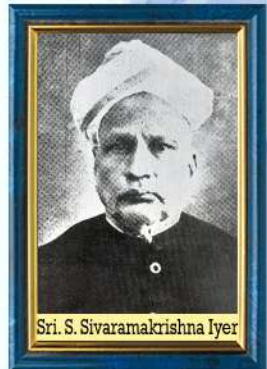

NATIONAL COLLEGE - A SKETCH

National College, Trichinopoly was founded on 11th June 1919, thanks to the munificence of the late Diwan Bahadur S.Rm. Ct. Pethachi Chettiar, Zamindar of Andipatti and the collective initiative and zeal of eminent personalities like Justice T.V. Seshagiri Iyer, Sir. T. Desikachariar, Sri. N. D. Subbarama Iyer and Sri. S. Sivaramakrishna Iyer. The college, in fact, had its origin in the National High School founded on 11th June 1886.

The founders conceived the idea of a national institution to promote among the youth, the loftiest ideals that constitute the essence of Indian Culture and Nationalism. True to its name, National College continues to impart cultural values and fulfil its role as one of the premiere nation-building institutions of the country. Under the stewardship of eminent scholars and administrators as its Principals and Secretaries, the College has become a seat of Higher Education and has earned a reputation for high moral standards.

The College functioned in Teppakkulam Campus for nearly four decades from 1919. On 8th July 1959, the College started functioning in the new campus, close to the Railway Junction on the Tiruchirapalli - Dindigul Highway. The College celebrated its Golden Jubilee in the year The Golden Jubilee Block was dedicated to the cause of education.

The Diamond Jubilee of the College was celebrated during the year 1980-81, under the Presidentship of Hon'ble Shri R. Venkataraman, the most distinguished alumnus, the then Minister of Finance, Government of India, who later became the President of India, later. To commemorate the occasion, Principal Saranathan Iyengar Block was constructed, where the present Resource Centre of the College. The College fondly recollects with gratitude its principal architects and the glorious line of teachers.

The Vice-Chancellor of Bharathidasan University, Dr.V.R. Muthukaruppan presided over the Platinum Jubilee Celebrations. It was an occasion to record the services of the College to the underprivileged section of the society.

The National Evening College emerged in the year 1978, to cater to the needs of the employed youth, who wanted to improve their knowledge and qualification for their betterment, by attending part-time classes, in the evening. New programmes were introduced. The IT revolution brought in new trends in curriculum designing and course content. The term, 'Evening College', became

the 'Unaided Programmes', from the academic year 2005-06. The 'Aided programmes', and the 'Unaided programmes' coexist.

The college introduced co-education pattern from the academic year 2007, to respond to the social commitment for the girls in the arena of higher education. The College started functioning in two shifts to meet the growing demand for learning among the youth.

The College offers nineteen Postgraduate and twenty Undergraduate Programmes, apart from part-time and job-oriented programmes. Thirteen departments offer the facility to register for the Doctoral and M.Phil. Degree programmes. The staff members vie with each other in producing quality research publications. The establishment of National College Instrumentation Facility (NCIF), the only one of its kind in this part of the country, is one of the examples for the provision of adequate infrastructure for high-end research.

This supports a wide spectrum of researchers in science, across the country. The National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC), accredited the College at 'A' Level in the first cycle (2005) and 'A+' in the third cycle (2016). The University Grants Commission (UGC) conferred the Autonomous status in the year 2010 and conferred the privilege of "College with Potential for Excellence" status, in the year 2011.

The MHRD, Government of India has identified the college for Study in India (SII) Programme, to admit foreign students in various academic programmes.

The management of the college, under the banner of Dr. Kalamegham Centre for Studies on Indian Culture and Heritage, initiated a Vedic School in February 2017 - Sri Sarguneswarar Vedha Padasala. Situated inside the college campus, it is a residential traditional learning hub, where twelve pupils learn Shukla Yajur Veda under a qualified Ghanapathi. They learn the subjects like Mathematics and English also.

The managing agency of the College, viz., Dr. V. Krishnamurthy Educational Foundation, has already under its feathers, Sessa Iyengar Memorial Higher Secondary School, situated in the ancient historic town of Woraiyur, Tiruchirapalli. This school takes care of the needs of the students hailing from the under-privileged society. Smt. Rajam Krishnamurthy Public School, under the CBSE pattern, is born in the year 2018. It is situated opposite to the College Campus, abutting the Boys' Hostel. Empowered with the latest state-of-art technology, the school promises to provide uncompromising education at all

levels. Both the schools under the management are the feeder schools for the college.

The College celebrated its Centenary Year with all grandeur under the chairmanship of Dr. V. Krishnamurthy. In fact, the celebration took place with a number of events, during the whole academic year 2019-2020. Hon'ble Shri M. Venkaiah Naidu, the Vice President of India formally inaugurated the Centenary Celebrations on 10th January 2020. It was a memorable and momentous occasion. It was a once-in-a-lifetime-event, for the hundreds of alumni and retired staff, who were present on the occasion.

Dr. V. Krishnamurthy Educational Foundation, a registered society, is the managing parent agency for all these institutions. The College is managed by a Committee consisting of fourteen members with Sri. Jayakar Krishnamurthy as its President and Sri K. Raghunathan as its Secretary.

The College has around 260 faculty members, 100 supporting staff and about 4650 students on the rolls. We pray that, with the untiring efforts of the management, the wholehearted cooperation of all the employees and the inquisitive students, the college shall reach greater heights in the future. The management is keen that a child entering the Pre-KG Class should be provided a wholesome education till the child completes the Doctorate.

ACADEMIC INFORMATION

1. Tuition fee:

The Tuition fee is to be paid in one installment for each semester. The tenth working day of the semester is the last date to pay the fee without fine. An additional fee of Rs.50/- with a fine of Rs.10/- per day of delay is to be paid before the 30th working day, for the payment of the tuition fee with fine (vide. Paragraph No.3, also). The names are liable to be struck of the rolls, after that. On the discretion of the Principal, the student may be re-admitted by the payment of full fees, with re-admission fee and late fee, as per the norms. Absence from the college, with or without the sanction of the Principal, shall not be deemed as an excuse for not paying the fees, before the stipulated period.

2. Scholarships/stipend/financial assistance/fee concessions:

- a. State Government Scholarships for BC/MBC/DNC/SC/ST
- b. Government of India Scholarships Central Sector Scheme – National scholarship portal <http://scholarships.gov.in>.
- c. UGC Single girl-child scholarship Scheme 2020-2021 for P.G. Programme.
- d. Prime Minister's scholarship for the wards of Railway employees for the students of BBA, BBM, BSc Biotechnology and BSc Microbiology
- e. State Government Ph.D. Research Scholarship for all communities
- f. State Government Ph.D. Research Scholarship for SC/ST

The required percentage in attendance is one of the criteria essential for applying/sanctioning/renewal of the scholarship, apart from an excellent scoring at the previous level of study (+2 /Degree). A few more scholarships are also made available from time to time. Students are to get updated by carefully perceiving the notice board, and the circulars/announcements from the Principal.

3. Attendance:

Attendance is marked at the advent of every hour. Students coming late may not be marked attendance for that hour. Also, those who are not inside the class-room/lab may not be marked the attendance. They

have to seek the permission of the concerned Class Teacher and the Head of the Department, which will ultimately be sanctioned only by the Principal. The students are to apply for leave of absence, much earlier, to avoid embarrassment (vide. Rules, Regulations and Instructions). Absence for more than six working days may cause the name to be struck off the rolls. They may be re-admitted, at the discretion of the Principal. Abstaining from the periodical tests/examinations would tell upon the attendance and internal assessment. Only those who have 75% or more of the total attendance are permitted to appear for the Semester Examinations. And Attendance Certificates are issued only to those who have proven integrity. Any appeal for exemption from the production of Attendance Certificate is considered, if only the Principal is convinced about the fact that the lapse is beyond the control of the student. The number of working days per semester is not less than 90 days. Hence the students are advised to secure 75% of attendance, in each course, in which he/she is going to appear for the examination. Those who fail to do so, would have to re-do the concerned course and/or semester(s), after the completion of the whole programme. In other words, students having shortage of attendance in the First Semester won't be permitted to sit for the Semester II. They have to re-do Semester I with a minimum attendance and then proceed to the Semester II.

4. Syllabus / Curriculum:

The Syllabi of all the programmes are to be downloaded from the college website www.nct.ac.in. Browse this website and receive regular updates about the college and the important linked websites and make use of the facilities available through the 'student portal'.

5. Issue of Certificates:

Students willing to obtain Course/Transfer Certificate are to apply in the prescribed form, paying the prescribed fee. The office of the Principal would issue them, after verifying the necessary documents. Students are to apply to the Bharathidasan University to obtain Provisional Certificate and Migration Certificate, etc., through the Principal's office.

CHOICE BASED CREDIT SYSTEM (CBCS) & OUTCOME BASED EDUCATION (OBE)

All the programmes offered by the College come under CBCS and OBE. It helps the students to keep pace with the latest developments and trends in higher education in compliance with the assurance of quality in liberalisation and globalisation. This came into effect from the year 2005-06, as per the guidelines of the affiliating university. A restructured syllabus is introduced from the year 2010, as the college became autonomous, at all levels of U.G. and P.G. Programmes. The structure and syllabi are subjected to revision at least once in three years or as and when required.

The University Grants Commission (UGC) has initiated the mission of improving the quality of higher education in India through its Quality Mandate in the year 2018. This aims to fill the gap in acquiring degree and attain the level of employability. Therefore, it took the drive for developing Learning Outcomes based Curriculum Framework (LOCF) under the international standards of Outcome Based Education (OBE).

Learning in this pattern, Bachelor's Degrees are awarded on the basis of demonstrated achievement of outcomes (expressed in terms of knowledge, understanding, skills, attitudes and values) and academic standards expected of graduates of a programme of study. Learning outcomes specify what exactly the graduates are expected to know after completing a particular programme of study, understand and capable of doing what they ascertain at the end of their programme of study. The expected learning outcomes are used as reference points that would help formulate graduate attributes, qualification descriptors, programme learning outcomes and course learning outcomes which, in turn will help in curriculum planning & development, and in the design, delivery and review of academic programmes. They provide general guidance for articulating the essential learning associated with programmes of study and courses within a programme.

Keeping in mind the approach of the UGC on LOCF and by its directions, our College, through its august Academic Council, decided to implement OBE in the curriculum from the academic year 2019-20 onwards.

a. Conditions under which the student is to opt for Sirappu Tamil I and II

- ① The student had studied Tamil in 10th Standard and/or 12th Standard. and had opted for the Language French/Hindi/Sanskrit, instead of Tamil etc.
- ① The student with mother tongue Tamil had studied Language French, Hindi, Sanskrit, etc., in the 10th Standard (OSLC/CBSE/AISC) and/or 12th Standard (TN State Board) and had opted for French/Hindi/ Sanskrit in the College.

b. Conditions under which the student is to opt for Adippadai Tamil I and II

- ① The student is from outside the State of Tamil Nadu, whose mother tongue is NOT Tamil and/or who has not studied Tamil at any level.
- ② The student is from Tamil Nadu, whose mother tongue is NOT Tamil and/or who has not studied Tamil at any level.

If the students fail to identify this mandatory ruling, they will not qualify for the Degree.

COURSES FOR EXTRA - CREDITS

The curriculum offers an innovative practice of scoring extra credits through self-study courses. The student may choose one or a maximum of two self-study courses. The students are to identify the courses from the given list. Classes won't be met for such courses. The general attendance is taken into account for the award of marks for attendance in the Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA). Apart from this, the tutor would evaluate the assignments and CIA tests, given to the students, periodically. The Marks Statement would carry the nomenclature of such courses and credits obtained, at the completion of the course/programme.

AUTONOMOUS EXAMINATIONS

- The candidates are to take the examinations at the end of each semester
– October / November – for odd semesters and April / May – for even semesters.
- Those who are to reappear for the examination in any course, are permitted so, in the subsequent semesters to take the examinations as the arrear course.
- But if the candidate is to reappear for the practical examinations, he/she is to take them with the Regular Practical examinations, as per the schedule.
- The candidates are to appear for the Viva-voce Examination, defending their Project.
- Oral examinations are a part of Communicative English Course and Practical Examinations in science subjects. They carry five

marks each. In other words, the theory course carry a maximum of 70 marks and oral examinations carry 5 marks. Put together, it is 75 marks.

PREPARE YOURSELF FOR THE EXAMINATIONS

- Look for the important dates, announced by the Principal.
- Look at the notice board for your regularity in attendance. Candidates, who don't have 75% of the total attendance, are not permitted to sit for the examinations. However, you may, with 60% to 74% of attendance, condone the examinations, only on genuine reasons based on the Medical Certificate issued by the competent authority. If you have less than 60% of the attendance, you are not eligible for the examinations. You are to re-do the concerned semester/semesters after the completion of the entire programme of study.
- Mark them in your Handbook. Stick to the schedule.
- Update the College Executive for Attendance, with your 'On other duty' attendance certificates, well in advance. Late submission of attendance certificates would not be honored. Be an early bird. Seek the advice of your Tutor/Head of the Department.
- Do all your examination-related work by yourself. Don't designate this work to your friends or relatives. They may err.
- Pay all the fees due, to the college office or the online banking services, whichever the office demands. The application form for examination would open for you in the online-portal of the Controller of Examinations, if only these conditions are met with. Keep all the fee-receipts handy.
- If you are in the first semester, tick mark (✓) your Language Course (French/Hindi/Tamil/Sanskrit) in the Examination application form, available online in the college website. Take a print-out and keep it for future reference. Don't forget.
- If you are in the other semesters, tick mark (✓) the courses you are going to appear, including the arrear courses, if any, in the application form, available online from the college website. Pay the fees for the arrear courses.
- The Principal shall announce the date for the release of the Hall Tickets. Visit the college Website, follow the instructions therein, and take a print-out of the hall-ticket. Verify your photograph and other details therein. Your access to this portal is limited to

a specific period, beyond which it will be closed. And those who fail to download and bring the print-out of the hall ticket to the examination, along with the identity card, are not permitted to appear for the examination. The Principal uses his discretion in solving the discrepancy, based on the supporting documents you produce, related to the issue.

THE DAY OF THE EXAMINATION

- Start early from your house / hostel / room / accommodation.
- Pack your bag with the Hall ticket, writing materials and adorn yourself with the Identity Card. Don't forget. Produce them when the invigilator demands. Entry into the hall without these two or either, forfeits your candidature.
- The examinations commence at 09.30 for the Forenoon Session and conclude at 12.30, afternoon. The commencement is at 2.00 for the afternoon session which concludes at 5.00 p.m. Enter the examination hall 10 minutes before the commencement of the examinations. Avoid arguments.
- Sit at the place designated to you, where your registration number is written.
- You are denied admission to examination, if you arrive late.
- You are to remain in the hall for the entire period of the examination.
- Take the signature of the invigilator on all your answer papers. Verify your register number in the attendance sheet. Put your signature, at the appropriate place.
- **Malpractice in any form is an offence.** If you are found guilty, law would take its course.
- Don't walk along the corridors or loiter in the campus, during the examinations.
- Hand over your answer papers, securely fastened, to the Invigilator. Leave the hall only when directed to do so, by the invigilator.
- Scrupulously follow the instructions of the Principal, Chief Superintendent of the Examinations, Controller of Examinations and the Invigilator. Discipline is your ornament.

QUESTION PAPER PATTERN

The general pattern for the question paper (theory) for the Semester Examinations:

Section A

Question Nos 1 to 20, Multiple Choice Questions, each question having four answers under the choice. $20 \times 1 = 20$ Marks

Section B

Question Nos. 21 to 25, One of the two Questions, under each subdivision. (Either ... Or ... pattern) $5 \times 5 = 25$ Marks

Section C

Question Nos. 26 to 30 Internal Choice Questions (Three out of Five Questions) $3 \times 10 = 30$ Marks

This pattern is subject to change, depending upon the needs of the Courses or Programmes. The students are advised to consult the Faculty member and/or the Head of the Department.

EVALUATION OF INTERNAL ASSESSMENT

The Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA), is based on the performance of the student in the Assignment, Tests, Seminars and Attendance, every semester. This score is coupled with the Semester Examinations, to decide the percentage of marks secured by the student. This can be converted into the grade points. The Course Teacher evaluates the performance. This evaluation is consolidated at the end of the course. The components for the CIA are:

PASSING MINIMUM

Undergraduate

The passing minimum for CIA and end semester examination, shall be 40%, individually and as aggregate.

Postgraduate

A candidate shall be declared to have passed in each course, if he/she secures not less than 40% marks in the end semester examinations and 40% marks in the CIA and not less than 50% in the aggregate.

M.Phil.

The Candidates shall be declared to have passed each course, if he/she secures not less than 50% marks in the end semester examinations and 50% marks in CIA and less than 50% as the aggregate.

SUPPLEMENTARY EXAMINATIONS

These examinations are conducted at the end of the final semester within 15 days of the declaration of the results for those outgoing students with an arrear in only one course.

IMPROVEMENT OF INTERNAL ASSESSMENT MARKS

The students, who fail to attend the CIA Test or submit the assignment, are permitted to write the Test/Assignment, before finalising the CIA marks, during the semester, at the discretion of the Principal. The dates of the tests are decided by the concerned Head of the Department, in consultation with the tutor and the staff-in-charge of the respective course.

The students who fail to secure the passing minimum in the CIA of a course, may be permitted only once, to improve the Internal Assessment in the subsequent semesters by writing three assignments and two tests, by remitting a fee of Rs.500/- per course.

In case of P.G. Students, those who have secured a passing minimum of 40% in both the CIA and end semester examinations, but failed to secure 50% in aggregate, are considered as failed candidates. Such students are not permitted to improve CIA. However, he/she can only appear for the theory examination in the subsequent semesters to secure the minimum pass of 50% in the aggregate.

TRANSPARENCY, RE-TOTALING AND REVALUATION

There is a provision for obtaining transparency (photocopy) of the answer scripts by remitting a fee of Rs.300/- per course. A student may also opt for re-totalling of his/her answer scripts by remitting a fee of Rs.300/- per course

A Student may also apply for revaluation of the answer scripts by remitting a fee of Rs.500/- per course. However, in the process of revaluation, the answer scripts for the course concerned may not be revalued directly. Rather, the transparency of the answer scripts for the applied course, would be scrutinised for its essentiality before revaluation.

IMPROVEMENT OF MARKS

The college permits the students willing to improve their marks/grade points by appearing for the subsequent end semester examinations, if he/she does not have any arrear till that semester (in which he wants to apply for improvement). A fee of Rs.500/- is to be paid for each course. The candidate is to specify the course/courses, which he

desires to improve, separately, while applying for improvement. The college gives only one chance for such improvement. This provision is given only to facilitate the student to improve the grade point average. And they are not eligible for appearing in the Ranking Examinations conducted by the college and the university.

CREDITS

The term 'Credit', refers to the weightage given to a course, usually in relation to the instructional hour and content of the course assigned to it. The total minimum credits, required for completing U.G. Programme, and PG Programmes are 120 and 90 respectively. For the details of credits for individual components and individual courses are to be obtained from the course structure of the syllabus found in the college website.

RANKING SYSTEM

The Rank Certificates for the first rank holders, are issued for every Programme under the Autonomous Stream. The candidate must have passed the examinations in the first attempt in the prescribed duration of the programme and should not have absented himself for any of the courses (for absence is considered as an attempt). The Bharathidasan University too conducts Ranking Examinations (URE) for the toppers in every programme. The first rank holders of all the autonomous colleges and the top 20 rank holders of the non- autonomous colleges are eligible to sit for the examination conducted by the University. The toppers are the University Rank Holders, irrespective of the grades they have obtained in the end-semester examinations.

REVISION OF REGULATIONS AND CURRICULUM

The college may, from time to time, revise, amend or change the regulations and the curriculum, if necessary. Any such modification is communicated through the Principal's Office.

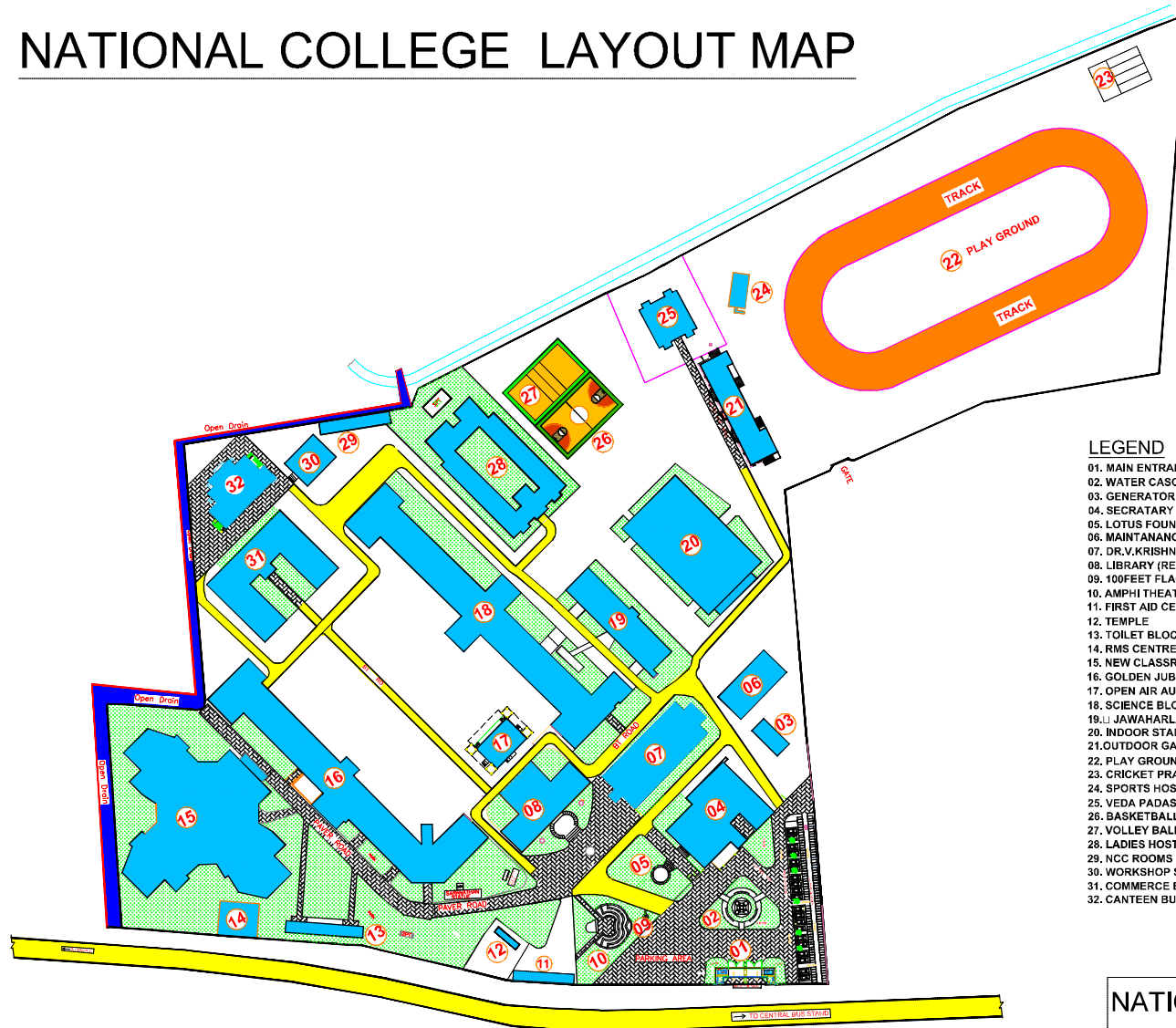

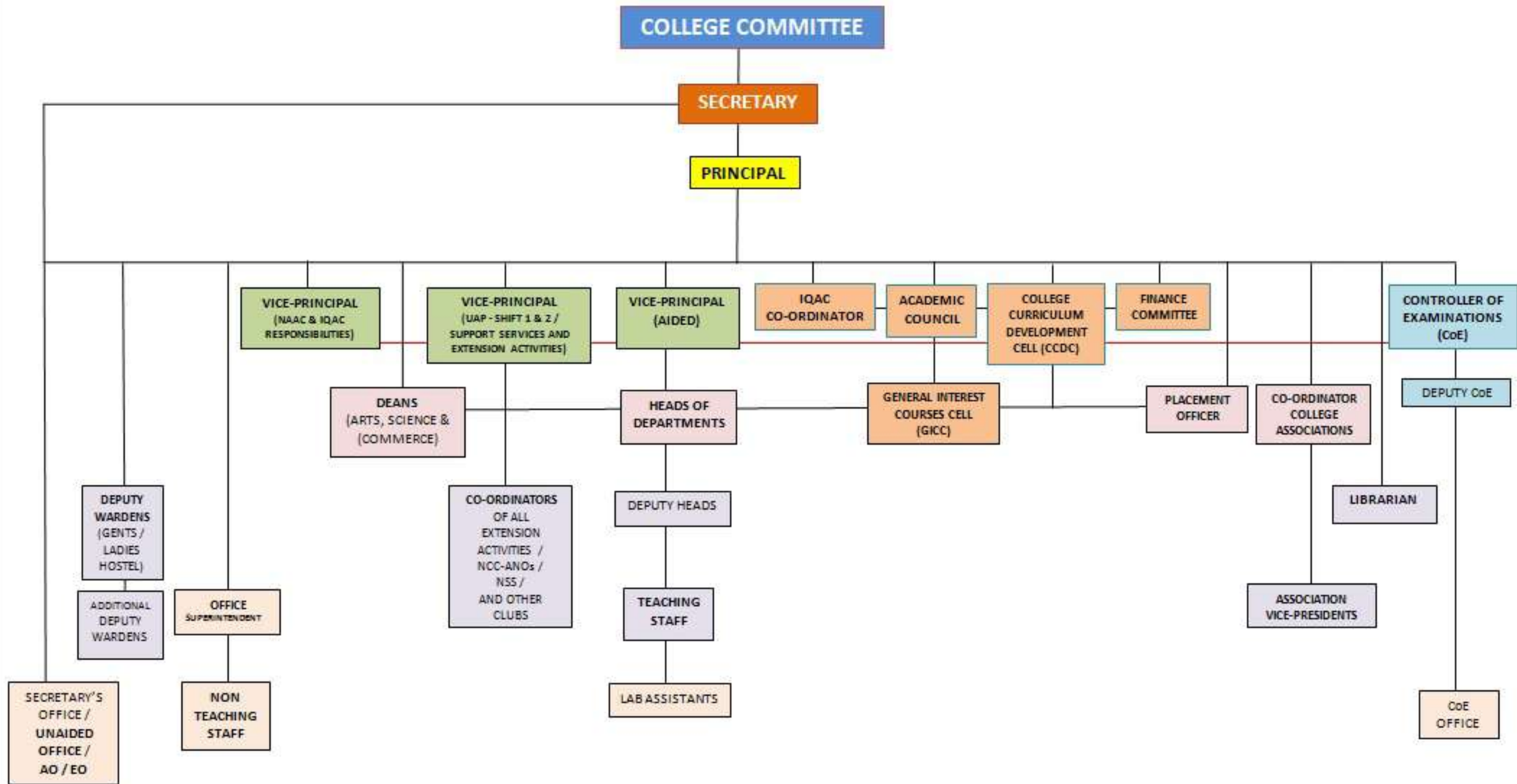
